Our future strategy will focus on evidence as well as drawing on engagement with others, including findings from the members' survey which many of you kindly completed. This told us that the top priorities among members for the ABF include: providing financial support to those unable to work or due to the cost of living crisis, helping more people, improving the process of accessing support, increasing the membership, developing fundraising, and broadening further the range of support.

We will consider all of this, alongside key areas of need and where the ABF can create the most impact and is best placed to make a difference within the acting and stage management community going forward. This will result in a strategy with clear priorities for the organisation over the next few years.

My treatment and recovery has been a long process - but the ABF has been there every step of the way. You have an incredible and extensive career in a precarious industry; what three habits or life skills do you think have helped you to have longevity?

(1) I try and walk everywhere as keeping fit is vital... so rather than taking the lift I will walk up the stairs and I will walk through London as it is such a lovely way to see everything and get fresh air.... I also exercise when I can....

(2) I only worry about things I can change and don't about things I can't...

(3) I try to look for the positive in everything and everyone.... And live each day to the full....

Also, there is one more quote I want to add... I looked after Quentin Crisp for a week and the quote he gave me that has stuck with me forever was "Miss Joseph... Believe in fate, but lean forward where fate can see you"....

### What differences would you notice in starting your career today if you were beginning your profession in **2024**?

When I came into the business, there were repertory theatres where you could learn your craft, and many fewer TV channels and no reality television.... You also had to work for forty weeks before you could get your equity card to go on TV or the West End... it was never about being famous but being in the business you loved and wanted to work in...

### What has been your favourite piece of theatre or TV drama over the last 12 months and why?

In the musical world, I have loved seeing Sunset Boulevard reimagined by Jamie Lloyd, which was just electric... and the play The Motive and the Cue.. about Richard Burton playing Hamlet in New York for John Gielgud, who was played by Mark Gatiss, who was beyond brilliant ... John Gielgud was one of my favourite actors, and it was like he had returned. Glorious!....

#### Why is the theatre meaningful to you?

I think there is nothing more wonderful than live theatre... every night is different and working with an audience is a skill and sitting in an audience I think can be life changing. I wanted to act from the age of four!

### Jarryd's Story

A year to the date, I walk out of hospital **cancer-free** and completely humbled by one of the most enduring years of my life.

At the beginning of February 2023, the day I signed my West End debut contract to perform in We Will Rock You, I was diagnosed with a tumour in my left lung. The term reality "slaps you in the face" couldn't have been clearer. So, the journey began.

To say nothing ever prepares you for these calls is the truth. I absolutely did feel like I was in a movie. Like a slow motion of my life was panning out before my very eyes. Why was I the main character? Is this specialist actually telling me this right now? It was surreal.

All I can say is thank God for my community, my family, the best friends in the world, and the ACTORS' BENEVOLENT FUND, **who had my back immediately**. A collective group of ANGELS who guided me to a place where I could choose to live and have peace of mind.

Unfortunately, my second surgery was more complicated. Lower lobectomy (removal of half my lung). Yikes! What transpired after that was about 4 weeks of complications trying to heal with infections beginning. Unfortunately, this infection persisted to the point that on the 27th of December, I had another surgery to wash out the lung, clear the infection and close an air leak that wouldn't heal. However, the best news was that I was officially CANCER FREE! The relief was worth it all. The mental game has definitely been the toughest part of this entire experience.

A couple weeks later, I'm feeling the strongest I have felt. It's my first week out of hospital, and the normalcy of life is so comforting. I still have a chest drain and an air leak I'm nursing, but my body is working hard to heal.

One day at a time! I miss performing so much. I miss everything I was physically able to do. Our health is everything, absolutely everything.

Moving to London, Stoker was also later to take up the role of business manager of the Lyceum theatre, a job he stayed in for 27 years.

### **Thought of the Month**

We were deeply moved by Samantha Morton's (Actor, She Said, The Whale, Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them, The Walking Dead, writer I Am...Kirsty and director The Unloved) acceptance speech at BAFTA.

Samantha received the BAFTA Fellowship, the British Academy's highest honour at the BAFTA Film Awards. During her speech, the actor recalled how watching Ken Loach's Kess saved her. "Seeing poverty and people like me, my life and my family on the screen, I recognised myself. Seeing representation matters."

"You see the stories we tell, they actually have the power to change people's lives. Film changed my life. It transformed me and it led me here today."
